

"Tex" Hill and the Salween River Gorge Raid

By early 1942, American Volunteer Group (AVG/Flying Tigers) losses due to air-to-air combat, training losses, operational losses and Japanese attacks had risen to the point where replacement aircraft for their dwindling number of Curtiss P-40B Tomahawks were desperately needed. Six of the thennew, more powerful P-40E's were taken from USAAF stocks and flown to Africa via the US-Brazil-Azores-West Africa ferry route and were picked up by AVG pilots and ferried to China.

Delivered in standard USAAF camouflage and markings of the time (OD/NG, cocardes in six positions with the red center and U.S. ARMY on the wing undersides), the aircraft were quickly repainted. The cocardes were overpainted in Dark Green (most likely a U.S. British equivalent), and the markings of 3rdSquadron AVG and Chinese national insignia were added. Sharkmouths lacking the black interior were also painted on. According to a former AVG mechanic, in order to fool the Japanese into thinking the AVG had received more new P-40E's than they actually had, the aircraft were painted in new even-numbered ID numbers from 100 to 110!

In China, Burma had been conquered and the

Japanese threatened to conquer the remainder of China. The single largest obstacle to their plans was the steep and treacherous Salween River Gorge. The single suspension bridge was all that stood between the Japanese moving into both China and India. The bridge had to be taken out. Only the P-40E's of 3rd Squadron were capable of carrying external bombs and were chosen for the raid, with the older Tomahawks flying top cover.


Four former U.S. Navy pilots primarily from 2nd Squadron AVG (Hill, Lawlor, Jones and Rector) were chosen to carry out the actual bombing due to their training and experience in dive bombing while with the Navy. Olson, Schilling, Haywood and Smith flew top cover in Tomahawks.

From May 7 to 11, 1942, the AVG attacked and destroyed the Salween River Gorge Bridge, then attacked and destroyed Japanese troops and equipment backed up along the steep mountain road leading to what remained of the bridge.


When they were done, the face of the war in China had changed forever.


Step 1 - Cockpit Painting




Step 1a - Cockpit Assembly




Step 2 - Fuselage Assembly




Step 3 - Wing Assembly




Step 4 - Cockpit, Wings, Etc. Attachment




Step 5 - Drop Tank, Stabilizers, Etc.





Step 6 - Landing Gear, Etc.
